





BACKGAMMON and LUCK

How often have you heard backgammon players talk about luck? . . . the bad luck they had or the good luck someone else had. Usually, if you'll notice, the reference to luck does come from the loser. He's always complaining about either his bad or the other guys good luck. In reality, backgammon, like many other gambling games that are played between friends without a casino or bookie in the middle give the odds of luck equally to everyone. The casino or bookie has his "vig" or his edge on the percentage of all bets given, which is where he makes his own luck. However, when playing without a casino-type affiliation, where you're just playing the dollars won and lost with no vig, luck then becomes an even equation for everyone.

Over the short haul, you may find that yes, somebody can have luck - one, two sessions, or even one, two or three months. It can be a bad luck streak or a hot hand, but over time, 6 months, a year, 5 years, 10 years, everyone has the same luck. It averages out. So the way to play backgammon is to make the plays that go with the odds. If you're on a cold streak, there are occasions when you'll get clobbered even though you make the percentage play. But over the long haul, the percentage play will make you a winner. Those people who do not make the percentage plays are the ones that are always talking about luck affecting them in the negative manner. 
