BACKGAMMON Learning to win by Lewis Deyong

One of the most amusing facets of the current worldwide backgammon boom is the backgammon player's ego. One of the most popular methods of massaging that ego around the circuit is to write a book. The result of most of these little ego trips is an incredibly boring book on the subject — few of them actually written by the named authors, and all of them repetitive and lacking in humour.

This book is different. For a start, Lewis Deyong has written it all himself and he knows the game from A to Z.

Include in that comprehensive alphabetical bracket the letter H for hustling! Byt also, much more important, include another H for humour. Lewis has succeeded in packing in a wealth of humour and anecdote which spices the instructional narrative and the vitally important diagrams.


One of the most attractive features of backgammon is the humour which can accompany even the most important of matches, whether they be tournament or money matches.

Lewis himself has maintained his own brand of dry humour both as a professional player and promoter of backgammon around the world and also, more noticeably, as an auctioneer. I have never ceased to wonder at his ceaseless flow of patter — some of it extremely cynical but always funny — during his marathon auctions, some of them lasting hours. If you have ever tried holding the stage and the microphone for this length of time, as I have, you will appreciate the testing nature of the task.

Lewis has allowed his wit to spill onto these pages and we, who have played the game around the world, can testify how often he hits the target. The anecdotes, even if some names are masked by pseydonym, are true too.

As a professional horseracing correspondent, I find I have less time than I might like to play backgammon these days, particularly in time-consuming tournaments, so I always take part of my holidays to coincide with the World Championships at Paradise Island, Nassau, and the European Championships in Monte Carlo, both sponsored by Philip Morris and run by Lewis Deyong.

These are "musts" in any player's



diary, and novice readers of this book who might feel too inexperienced to enter should take heart from the fact that Ken Goodman, winner of the 1977 World Championship, had only been playing for about a year.

Once you follow the text of this book and particularly the excellent diagrams, and discuss them with those of your friends who are developing a grasp of the game, you could be good enough to enter any championship within a matter of a few months.

You need never feel overawed by your opponent. Take heart from my own personal experience, described elsewhere on these pages, of success in the Q.E.II International Tournament back in April 1974, ostensibly an invitation World Championship confined to thirty-two players. I only got a place in the lineup in my twin capacities as writer and auctioneer. Yet, in a tournament

designed to cut out flukes — only one progressively longer match per day — I was able to knock out three of the top seeds, including the American Captain Barclay Cooke in a twenty-nine point final. It lasted four-and-a-half hours for a score of 29-28, two bottles of champagne consumed in the match (by myself) and a cheque for £10,000. The victory was particularly well received by my bookmakers at home!

So, if I can do it, you can.

Read this book and you will both learn and enjoy. Lewis Deyong has produced a winner — by far the best book on backgammon ever written.
